Mesquite Control

Did you know that when Horse Creek Ranch was still a "working ranch" one of the ongoing tasks of the foreman was control of mesquite trees? Often viewed as the bane of any ranch, mesquite trees were described in a recent <u>Brush Busters</u> newsletter by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service as "one of the toughest, most invasive species of brush in the world."

Why try to control it? Ask anyone who's had a tire punctured by one of the incredibly tough thorns that cover the trees, let alone have them puncture their skin. Additionally, the sticky sap of the mesquite tree is an ongoing attraction to fire ants and other pests. But more than anything, it's the tree's tendency to take over a pasture that causes landowners such problems.

The sad fact is that if they aren't kept in check, you'll find that what started out as one or two small mesquite bushes will, only a few years later, turn into an entire pasture full of the thorny trees. This is often done either by the spread of the seeds in the droppings of wildlife that eat the mesquite beans, or by the runner roots from nearby trees.

When caught early on, most mesquite can be controlled by a combination of digging or application of many herbicides available at most nurseries or greenhouses. For additional information on of control of this tenacious pest, we encourage you to contact your local Texas Cooperative Extension service agent.
